

Dr Kiera Lindsey:



Dr Kiera Lindsey is South Australia's History Advocate at the History Trust of South Australia where she serves as the principal spokesperson on history and South Australian history. She guides the sharing and telling of SA's diverse stories to bring our history into focus and 'give the past a future, now'.

Kiera is also an award-winning 'creative historian' who seeks to integrate different ways of knowing into her work; ranging from Indigenous knowledges to those associated with female wisdom.

Kiera has been enthusiastically exploring such ideas via books and articles, radio and podcasts, film and television, teaching and talking for over twenty years. Her first book, *The Convict's Daughter* was described as 'gloriously unput-downable' while her third book, *Wild Love: The Ambitions of Adelaide Ironside*, Australia's first artist to astonish the world, (Allen & Unwin 2023) has been described as a 'spectacular achievement' as well as a 'mighty feat in both research and the imagination'. In *Wild Love* Kiera follows in the footsteps of the 'wild and enthusiastic' Australian-born artist, Adelaide Ironside (1831-1867), as she draws on the artist's archive to speculate about early European female spiritualism in the Australian colonies, then her mystical explorations in 19th century London and Rome.
